Discussion and possible action:

Motion for the Board to approve the following CIS:

With regard to the Motion by CD 3 Councilmember Bob Blumenfield to the Los Angeles City Council, Council File No. 13-0197-S4, The Woodland Hills- Warner Center Neighborhood Council is concerned that additional issues related to Mobility need to be addressed as part of the study being proposed. These concerns are:

 Overall management of where new streets, publically accessible open space, and pedestrian accessible pathways is not occurring. A method to implement this important intent of the Plan needs to be studied. Failure to create a robust network of pathways is detrimental to mobility goals of the plan. Consideration must be given to a surcharge for those project that do not provide PAOS pathways at all project perimeters as failure to do so limits achievement of the mobility goals

- 2. Phasing of projects is allowing a potential imbalance of residential developmenet compared with development that would provide jobs. This was not a studied outcome of the Plan from a traffic point of view. There is a danger of second phases never being completed. As such, even temporary, incomplete mixed use from phasing causes imbalanced growth that works against the assumptions of the traffic model and the EIR. This will require remedial costs for traffic mitigation that have not been incorporated into the plan's fees. Consideration must be given to requiring all mobility fees for all phases to be due upon project approval and a surcharge fees of 33% if additional phases not completed within 7 years plus an additional surcharge of %17 if additional phases not completed within 10 years. This is to fund any required mitigations due to violating the tentets of the plan.
- 3. Medians are shown in the Street Section Figures of the plan. The medians serve as traffic slowing devices and as pedestrian waiting areas where crosswalks occur on wide streets. The medians are not being implemented and studies to justify requiring them should take place.
- 4. The route of the anticipated circulator needs to be restudied given the recent abandonment of the Variel Street extension. The Circulator contributed greatly to the designation of all of Warner Center as a Transit Oriented Development (T.O.D.). The route determines which areas are close enough to public transit to allow increased density, reduced parking requirments and many other important issues. Due to the imcomplete intended circulator route, there are reduced options for connectivity for the Commerce and Park Districts. As such they will place traffic activity on DeSoo, Canoga, Owensmouth and Topanga Canyon. As such consideration must be given to assessing increased fees in the Commerce and Park Distric as a result of this failure on the part of the Department of Transportation to recognize the long term impacts of not putting the Variel extension into effect. We note that DOT is violating the Ordinance as Section 6.1.2.2.7 of the ordinance states that two Activity Nodes <u>SHALL</u> be established in the district and lists Variel and Burbank as one of the intersections. Section 6.1.2.2.10 anticipates that Variel <u>WILL</u> be extended from Califa to Burbank and that the extension "will be in compliance with the LA standards for a collector street...". As such, City Planning and the Department of Transportation must consider increasing Mobility fees to implement these sections as intended by the Plan. Until the extension is put back into planned improvements, the Department of Transportation is violating the City's ordinance.

There is efficiency in studying multple facets of these issues at the present time both from a financial point of view and related to time. In additon, it is the Neighborhood Council's belief that the study proposed in the motion cannot be sufficiently considered as accurate without consideration of the items we have listed.

Motion: The WHIP Committee recommends that the Woodland Hills Warner Center Neighborhood Council (WHWCNC) Board of Directors **supports the motion to related to Council File 16-1324** relative to reaffirming support for Special Order 40 which was introduced on November 22, 2016 and referred to the Rules, Elections, Intergovernmental Relations and Neighborhoods Committee. Since its issuance in 1979, Special Order 40 has defined the procedures followed by Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) officers with regard to issues of immigration status. The underlying policy direction of Special Order 40 has been that a person's immigration status alone does not merit any police action. This policy has advanced the interests of public safety by allowing LAPD officers to provide law enforcement services equally to all residents of the City, including those whose immigration status may render them particularly vulnerable to victimization.

Special Order 40 mandates that Police Officers not question individuals solely to determine their Immigration status and ensuring that undocumented individuals residing in Los Angeles are able to report crime to the police and participate in investigations without fear of being deported. Within the current federal political climate, immigrant communities fear mass deportations and other disruptive and damaging policies. Newly elected federal seat holders have taken an aggressive stance on immigration and because of this the Los Angeles City Council reaffirms support for LAPD's policies related to dealing with undocumented immigrants, including Special Order 40, which ensures that all members of the community, regardless of immigration status, can interact with the Police Department without fear of being asked about their immigration status.

Motion: The Woodland Hills Warner Center Neighborhood Council (WHWCNC) supports the motion to related to Council File 06-0125-S2 relative to Nuisance Motels, Police Department Service Calls and a Permit Feasibility Study currently pending in the Public Safety Committee and a hearing date has not been determined. The City of Los Angeles is looking to explore the feasibility of a regulation program for nuisance motels that attract gang activity, drug use and prostitution. Such a program would have to be based on crime and calls-for-service statistics which would support the need to regulate motels. This motion is asking for a study to determine whether or not a police permit regulation is necessary to improve the safety issues at motels in the City. This is a citywide concern and necessary steps are needed in order to have an effective regulatory system in place. The WHWCNC supports the study and holds back any determination supporting or not supporting the conclusions that may be the result of the study until such conclusions are available for public vetting.
